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BEETLES Training

Otter and Juniper attended a leadership institute for the BEETLES (Better Environmental Education, Teaching, Learning & Expertise Sharing) Project this August. They brought back a plethora of materials and information to train our staff on new teaching and learning methods that will improve our program and the students' experiences. At the very heart of BEETLES, educators are asked to reconsider what learning should look like.

Research shows that teaching dominated by lecture and memorization are not contributing to long-term and meaningful learning. How do

educators make sure students are really learning, and get the information to "stick"? We found it helpful to abandon the idea that students are blank slates, ready to have concepts explained TO them.

In reality, students already have elaborate ideas and explanations about how the



world works. By inviting broad thinking, imagination, and curiosity, learning can be student-centered and much more meaningful. Because learning is a never-ending process of thinking, re-thinking, discussion, and reflection, it is the experience by which students arrive at an idea that is more beneficial than just "knowing" the right answer.

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Featured Park: Santa Rosa Plateau Ecological Preserve

Located in the southern region of the Santa Ana Mountains near Murrieta, the Santa Rosa Plateau Ecological Center is filled with educational and recreational opportunities for those of all ages, making it great for a family week-end excursion. If you and your family are searching for an out of the ordinary outdoor experience away from the crowds, this reserve is a perfect place to go. This ecological center is an impressive 9,000 acres and is home to various types of unique ecosystems such as an Engelmann Oak forest, wetlands, and mountainous chaparral. With all this protected space, there are countless species of birds, reptiles and mammals roaming the park, some of



which are endemic to Southern California, including a type of Fairy Shrimp that can only be found in the seasonal pools of this reserve! There are many different trails of varying difficulties, but two of the most popular hikes are

the Moreno and Machado Adobe hikes, which offer beautiful views and great places to picnic. The main destination of these hikes brings visitors to two adobe structures dating back to the mid 1800's, which were used as housing for

cowboys and farmhands. Along with multiple walking trails, the Santa Rosa Ecological Center is also home to various mountain biking and horse-riding trails, making it suitable for visitors of all pursuits. Trail use in this reserve costs \$4 for adults and \$3 for children, but needless to say, this wilderness experience is well worth it! Go enjoy the great outdoors with your friends and family!
